

has been a pioneer for
years, but he says this is
the greatest challenge
he's ever faced.









1 Every weekday morning, Ishmael meets with Chief Kgosi to pray. The chief has given Ishmael a special privilege. He's invited him to attend every gathering at the *kutla*, the village's sacred meeting place, and start the meetings with prayer and a Bible reading.

2 After meeting with the chief, Ishmael goes to the clinic to pray with the staff and patients and share a few verses of Scripture with them. Then it's off to the school to pray and sing with the children.

3 The Basarwa children love to sing and quickly learn songs about Jesus. You can often hear them singing at night before they go to bed.

- s Ishmael walks nearly everywhere he goes, carrying his well-worn Bible. He almost always has sand in his shoes!
- 6 This is a typical Basarwa home. It can be very cold in the desert at night, but because it's colder inside than outside the Basarwa sleep around a fire on the ground.
- "At first the villagers didn't like it when I came to visit," Ishmael says. "Some left when they saw me coming and others even moved away! But I kept praying for them and now some of them welcome me into their homes to study and pray."
- 8 You can often find Ishmael talking and praying with a young person in the village.









9 Sometimes Ishmael brings his church members oranges—a sweet, juicy treat in the dry Kalahari. From young to old, everyone seems to love them.

We Every Sabbath Ishmael shares the word of God with the Bere Seventh-day Adventist church plant members. Since he came to Bere a year ago, he's baptized eight new members. "It brings me the greatest joy to see people giving their lives to the Lord!" he says.

ome with me to a small desert village in Botswana. It's early Sabbath morning, but already the sun has turned the Kalahari sand into a lake of white fire.

Pastor Ishmael, a friendly Global Mission pioneer, is on his way to open the doors of the Seventh-day Chief Kgosi says he's seen many of his villagers transformed by God's power and believes this wouldn't have happened without the presence of a pioneer.

Adventist church. Villagers, leading children by the hand, are on their way to worship in it—largely because of Ishmael's ministry.

Years ago a pioneer helped start a church plant in this Basarwa community. But when he left, most of the members drifted away. When Ishmael came, he reached out to the villagers by following Christ's method of ministry—mingling, showing sympathy, ministering to needs, winning confidence, and then bidding them to follow God. In just one year he helped most of the former members renew their commitment to Jesus and baptized eight new believers!





Sometimes I feel discouraged when I think of the millions of people in the world who are still waiting to know Jesus. But then I remember Bere, where the ministry of a single church planter is making a difference. If the pioneer ministry can touch hearts there, it can reach people for Jesus anywhere.
